Dear Parents and Guardians,

Master Plan: Last week I attended the meeting on what we need to do to create our Asset Management Plan Phase 1. This phase involves identifying our priority needs by assessing what we currently have against what the research says is current best practice. The staff have evaluated the classroom spaces against the principles of good classroom design to identify priority areas and over the next few days will share what they see is their ideal components of each section. I have included a

table outlining the areas of the facilities analysis and invite anyone to make a comment about what they think will be an important part of developing Melton West PS for our future generations. Please feel free to highlight any elements that you think are important and we will incorporate this into the Planning Template, which is due to be endorsed by School Council at our next Meeting on June 20th.

Flexible and Multipurpose Spaces

- Spaces can be reorganised so that students can work in pairs, small groups and larger groups.
- Teachers can work from a variety of locations in the spaces.
- Furniture is comfortable, durable and adaptable to support different learning purposes.
- Explicit instruction and lectures can be provided for groups of up to 75 students.
- Students can work together on cross-curricula projects.
- Students can undertake a variety of passive and active learning activities without disruption and congestion.
- Students can make multi-media presentations and undertake performances.
- There are places for teachers and students to work together 1-1.
- Teachers can work collaboratively and create spaces for meetings.
- There are areas for study and reading.

Home Bases, Learning Neighbourhoods and Communities

- Groups of students work in their own space for most of the time.
- These are places for social interaction and the development of positive relationships.
- Spaces provide for the accessible and secure storage of computers, books, equipment and personal belongings.
- Two or more groups can share a place.
- Staff and students are co-located in the learning community.
- Students and staff have easy access to amenities.
- Larger groups can be reorganised into tutorial groups for explicit instruction.
- Art, design, technology, science and performing art spaces are accessible or integrated into the space.
- There are spaces for quiet study and conversation.
- There is provision for the secure display of student products, learning goals and achievements.

Indoor & Outdoor Learning Environments

- Ground floor indoor and outdoor learning spaces are connected.
- There are spaces for students to work on conversation and environmental projects.
- Students can access a range of outdoor recreation and adventure activities.
- There are outdoor places for socialising.
- There are quiet places student play and

reflection.

Specialist Focus Points

- There is access to art, wet and tactical areas.
- There are spaces for a range of physical activities and the development of skills.
- Students can access and use a range of media, materials and technology.
- There are flexible, appropriately equipped laboratory stations.
- Students can work on products and projects individually and in small groups and large groups.

Accessible Resources

- The ICT infrastructure enables 'anywhere, anywhere' access for students and staff.
- Students have ready access to resources in order to demonstrate learning in different ways.
- Learning spaces have access to data projectors, multi-media equipment and specialist scientific devices.
- Spaces and ICT infrastructure support a BYOD program.
- Resource storage is accessible, suitable and secure.

Community Orientation

- Parents and visitors can access suitable spaces for meetings and activities.
- Students can see staff working or have access to them.
- The character of the learning community is reflected in the entry to the school and other areas.
- There are places for meetings and interviews.
- Staff have places to socialise.

Comfort and Safety

- Learning spaces have natural ventilation including cross ventilation.
- Room temperatures are able to be controlled by staff
- There is suitable storage for chemicals, dangerous goods and equipment.
- Learning spaces have appropriate acoustic treatments.
- There is adequate natural light with minimal glare and impact on the use of ICT.

National Reconciliation Week (NRW): Each year National Reconciliation Week celebrates and builds on the respectful relationships shared by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and other Australians. This year is the 25th Anniversary of National Reconciliation Week, which is from 27th May to 3rd June each year. The

dates of National Reconciliation Week are important and significant because they represent two very important historical events in our history. May 27th is the anniversary of the 1967 referendum which saw over 90% of the Australian vote to have Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples recognised in the national census for the first time and June 3rd commemorates the High Court of Australia's landmark Mabo decision in 1992 which legally recognised that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples have a special relationship with the land that existed prior to colonisation and continues today. We recognise this connection to the land by acknowledging country at the beginning of each assembly. Tomorrow we have organised an incursion from an Aboriginal performer and have also invited our Prep LOTE teacher Mathew Gardiner to speak at assembly.

Policies: There are a number of school policies available on our school website. There are some that we are required to have to be registered as a school and others that are much more school based. All policies get reviewed periodically, usually every 3 years, before being endorsed by School Council. Earlier this term I sent out an invitation for any parents to join in a review of our Bullying Policy. I was pleased to hear from a few parents this morning about their views about this very important issue. Thank-you to those who joined in the conversation.

Berry Street Training: On Tuesday afternoon, our staff joined in with the second part of the Relationship Module which helped us understand the importance of empathy when working with students. One strategy they suggested was to think of one-liners to say to a child who is argumentative and refusing to listen. Statements such as; "I respect you too much to argue", "I'll listen when your voice is calm", "That must be hard for you"

that they got to 'Role Model' or 'Excellence'. This is the pinnacle of the Learning Ladder and children who exhibit the behaviours listed at that level get rewarded with Vivo points when they reach that level. The other part of the learning Ladder is like a strike system where the children receive consequences if they are not behaving appropriately. Every teaching environment has one and we have included a copy in this newsletter.
